The Professional Regulator: A professional development program for regulators

The National Regulators Community of Practice (NRCoP) and ANZSOG are pleased to announce that we have partnered with the Australian National University's School of Regulation and Global Governance (RegNet) to deliver a new professional development program for regulators.

As the job of regulators has become more demanding, there has been an increased interest in professionalising our practice, and a focus on the similarities in the challenges facing regulators in different areas and agencies.

Aotearoa New Zealand began the process of professionalising regulation in 2008, and the [Government Regulatory Practice Initiative \(G-Reg\)](#) was set up in 2015 to provide standardised training to regulators across agencies.

No similar system has existed until now in Australia, and NRCoP in partnership with RegNet has created a program of training modules and seminars – the Professional Regulator Program - to give Australian regulators access to training with a focus on the common issues regulators face.

The Professional Regulator Program aims to provide professional development for regulators, regardless of regulatory sphere or jurisdiction, that provides a common foundation of current, modern regulatory practice, increasing the professionalism and capacity of regulators around Australia.

In July 2023 participants will have the opportunity to enrol in the first stage of a four-level program:

- The Professional Regulator: Foundation – commences July 2023 for all regulators
- The Professional Regulator: Extension
- The Professional Regulator: Expert
- The Professional Regulator: Leader

The additional three levels will be developed following feedback from the NRCoP community.

The Professional Regulator: Foundation is a self-paced professional learning program that includes six modules focusing on regulatory practice:

1. **Who Regulates and Why**
2. **Licensing as Regulation**
3. **Understanding and Achieving Compliance**
4. **Using Information to Regulate**
5. **Regulatory Communication**
6. **Regulatory Professionalism and Ethics**

Participants will also have access to a program of 6 seminars that will expand on the topics and themes explored in the six online modules.

1. **Using our regulatory tools**
2. **Frontline regulators and processes**
3. **Understanding and achieving compliance**
4. **Regulatory information and stakeholder engagement**
5. **Regulatory communication**
6. **Regulatory relationships, professionalism and ethics**

FAQs

1. What is the Professional Regulator Program?

The Professional Regulator: Foundation program aims to provide professional development for regulators, regardless of regulatory sphere or jurisdiction, that provides a common foundation of current, modern regulatory practice, increasing the professionalism and capacity of regulators around Australia.

The Professional Regulator: Foundation program is the first part of a four-level program:

- The Professional Regulator: Foundation – commences February 2023 for corporate members and July 2023 for all regulators
- The Professional Regulator: Extension
- The Professional Regulator: Expert
- The Professional Regulator: Leader

The additional three levels will be developed following feedback from the NRCoP community.

2. Who should participate in the Professional Regulator: Foundation program?

This professional development program is for all early, mid to senior level regulators from all disciplines (federal, state and local government).

If you are new to licensing and approvals, compliance, working with regulated entities, using regulation, applying risk frameworks, managing regulatory comms — this course is for you!

3. What will I learn?

The course is a practical six module online self-paced professional learning program. It will take you approximately 90 minutes to complete each module. The modules will be released in order (one per week) and you will have 12 months to complete them. You choose the pace that best works for you.

The program includes 6 seminars (90 mins each) that will provide you with an opportunity to interact with your peers to discuss common regulatory issues and approaches. The seminars are facilitated by expert regulators and will be delivered online. Seminars are run on a rotational basis and repeated later in the year so if you miss one you will have the opportunity to participate at a later date.

The six modules focus on these areas of regulatory practice:

1) Who Regulates and Why	<p>After completing this module you will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • explain why contemporary regulation matters • identify who regulates in contemporary Australia • describe the major styles, tools and concepts of regulation in use in Australia today • know the regulatory approaches used by your organisation
2) Licensing as Regulation	<p>After completing this module you will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand the legal environment in which Australian regulators work • identify and explain regulators' authorising environment and the use of authorising tools, including licensing, permitting, accrediting and registering • apply these practical insights to real-life examples in complex regulatory environments
3) Understanding and achieving compliance	<p>After completing this module you will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand different explanations for, and approaches to compliance • consider and analyse the variety of reasons that may lead to non-compliance; • identify a range of options and strategies in the regulator compliance toolkit
4) Using Information to Regulate	<p>After completing this module you will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand the many ways information can inform regulatory best practice • identify key strategies for effectively gathering and using information, including evidence-based strategies and regulatory intelligence • reflect on how to effectively collect and utilise information to align and support regulatory objectives

<p>5) Effective regulatory communication</p>	<p>After completing this module you will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • identify the different kinds of regulatory communication and their value for regulatory practice • understand when and how to use specific regulatory communication strategies, including lessons from case studies of successes, mistakes and failures • refer to examples for mapping and planning regulatory communication plans and stakeholder engagement
<p>6) Regulatory Professionalism and Ethics</p>	<p>After completing this module you will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • reflect on the specific attributes and responsibilities of a professional regulator, considering them in relation to previous modules • develop a broad appreciation of issues related to ethics and ethical decision-making for regulators • comprehensively demonstrate foundational professional competencies, reflecting on essential elements of effective regulatory practice

The six seminar topics are:

Seminar	What will I learn?
<p>1) Using our regulatory tools</p>	<p>How can we better understand and fully use the regulatory frameworks and tools available to us, generally and for particular regulatory domains?</p>
<p>2) Frontline regulators and processes</p>	<p>Module 2 introduces licencing and authorising as fundamental regulatory activities. In this seminar we look at some of the challenges of authorisation. Many 'frontline' regulatory functions are performed by people in a wide range of service delivery or compliance roles that not directly connected to regulatory policy. What are the challenges and potential for 'connecting up' all levels of a regulatory</p>

	organisation?
3) Understanding and achieving compliance	We hope for compliance, but we often encounter defiance or indifference. How do we engage more fully with those who do not want to engage with us?
4) Regulatory Information and stakeholder engagement	How can we better use and share regulatory information? What are the challenges of doing so? What are the most effective strategies for using information to support engagement with regulated entities and stakeholders in our authorising environments?
5) Regulatory communication	What is best practice for regulatory communication? How can it support building cooperation with regulated entities and stakeholders? What are some of the challenges for communicating effectively as a regulator?
6) Regulatory relationships, professionalism and ethics	Most regulators are not alone in the regulatory spaces in which they operate. How do we navigate regulatory relationships without being compromised or captured? How do we communicate with, cooperate and collaborate with other regulators and regulatory actors within a federation? What works in developing those relationships, and when do they come under pressure?

4. How long does the program run for?

When you enrol, you will have 12 months to complete the six online modules and to participate in the 6 seminars.

5. Who will be able to do the program when it is open to all regulators in mid-2023 and how do I register?

All regulators, whether you work in an organisation that is a corporate member of the NRCOP or not, will be able to enrol in the Professional Regulator: Foundation program.

6. How much will it cost when the program is fully open in mid-2023?

The program will cost \$650 + \$65 GST for regulators who work in an organisation that is a corporate member of NRCoP.

All other regulators will be able to enrol in the program at a cost of \$1300 + \$130 GST.

8. How many hours will each module take to complete?

Each module takes approximately 90 minutes to complete. It is not necessary for you to complete the entire module in one sitting. You can save what you have done and return to it at a later stage.

Each seminar runs for 90 minutes.

9. What course materials will be provided to me?

Everything you need to complete the course will be provided to you. The modules are self-paced, and you can progress at a speed that suits your work schedule. The seminar series will consist of six themed seminars and will be offered two times per calendar year. These sessions will enable you to connect and work with your regulatory peers across a range of contemporary issues. This allows for busy regulators who can't find time to attend one seminar to catch it later on during the year.

10. How do I provide my feedback to ANZSOG on the course?

Surveys will be circulated at regular intervals during the program and after it concludes to collect your feedback.
